

Introduction

The document text that follows is a literal transcription of the 1830 Pigot & Co's directory of that year, complete with their spelling and punctuation and capitalisation or not.

This work also uses a selection from the late Victor A. Hatley's introduction to the March 1975, Directory reprint by Northamptonshire Libraries. (Copyright acknowleged).

The original printed copy of the documentary source used is in the Cyril Diamond Archive, housed at The Thrapston Centre.

The Northamptonshire described in the "National Commercial Directory" in 1830, is still rural in its life, the railways and their social impact are still 15 to 20 years away.

The population given for Northamptonshire as a whole in 1830, is 162,483, compared with 550,000+ today!

Thrapstone,

with the village of Islip and Neighbourhoods

Thrapstone is a small market town and parish, in the hundred of Navisford; 73 miles from London, 20 from Northampton, 19 from Peterborough, 17 from Huntingdon, 12 from Kimbolton and 8 from Higham Ferrers and Oundle. It is a neat and regularly built town, delightfully situated in a salubrious valley fertilized by the river Nen, over which is a fine stone bridge; upon the river, which is navigable to Lynn, the inhabitants carry on a trade in exporting grain, and importing groceries, timber, coals &c*5. There are no manufactures of consequence belonging to this town; the articles made are whips and thread lace; and on the Nen is a mill for paper, and others for grinding corn. There are some stone-quarries in the neighbourhood, which also abound with a beautiful white sand used for domestic purposes. The government of the town and parish is with the resident magistrate, and some officers appointed at the courts of the manors of Thrapstone, the honour of Gloucester, and the Navisford hundred court.

The only places for divine worship are the parish church and a methodist chapel. The church is a very neat edifice, dedicated to St, James; it contains some good monuments, and an excellent organ: in 1810 the church was repaired and beautified, at the expense of the parishioners. The country around Thrapstone is in a fine state of cultivation, well watered with springs, and enriched with beautiful woods; and so clustered with villages, that there are 20 within the circle of four miles-and it is said that, from an eminence near the town, 32 churches may be seen. The weekly market is held on Tuesday; the annual fairs are, the first Tuesday in May, and the first Tuesday after old Michaelmas, for cattle, sheep and hogs; the chartered fair, called St. James fair, is held on the 5th of August, for cattle of all kinds, hiring harvest-men; the hog and grain markets are the largest in this part of the county. The parish contained by the last returns, 854 inhabitants; and the village and parish of Islip, (about a mile from Thrapstone) 551.

Post Office Huntingdon street, Thrapstone.-Elizabeth Lever, *Post Mistress*. Letters from London arrive every morning at nine, and are despatched every afternoon at five. - Letters from the North arrive every morning at a quarter past eight, and are despatched every afternoon at half past three.


COACHES.

To LONDON, the *Old Oundle* (from Oundle) calls at the White Hart, every Monday, Wednesday & Friday morning at half past seven; goes through Kimbolton, St. Neots, Biggleswade, Baldock, Stevenage & Hatfield.

To BIRMINGHAM, the *Rising Sun* (from Cambridge) calls at the George, every Monday, Wednesday, Friday & Saturday morning at ten; goes through Wellingborough, Northampton, Daventry, Dunchurch & Coventry.

To CAMBRIDGE, the *Rising Sun* (from Birmingham) calls at the George, every Monday, Wednesday, Friday & Saturday evening at 5; goes through Huntingdon.

To **OUNDLE**, the *Old Oundle* (from London) calls at the White Hart, every Monday, Wednesday & Friday evening at 5.



CARRIERS.

To **LONDON**, Jenks & Son (from Oundle) call at the

Masons' Arms every

Monday & Thursday - and John Mayes (from Brigstock) calls at the Swan, every Thursday morning.

To **CAMBRIDGE**, Ebenezer Hubbard, from the George yard, every Monday & Thursday; goes through Huntingdon.

To **NORTHAMPTON**, Ebenezer Hubbard, every Tuesday & Friday evening To **OUNDLE**, Jenks & Son, every Monday, Tuesday & thursday evening - & Mary Blair, every Tuesday evening.

Personalities

No really famous name is listed by Pigot in the Northamptonshire section of his 1830 Directory, but some of the entries refer to people who played a notable part in local and sometimes national life.

Charles Arbuthnot and his wife, were friends and political confidants of His Grace the Duke of Wellington, who sometimes stayed with them at Woodford Lodge.

Context

1830 is the peak period of transport by way of turnpiked road, and excepting Middlesex, no county in England was traversed by a greater number of these important roads than Northamptonshire. These included main roads from London to North Wales, the north -west and north-east of England, and cross country roads such as those making up the route along which the Rising Sun coach travelled four times weekly between Birmingham and Cambridge, stopping at the George in Thrapston enroute. This is also the era of transportation by canal/river, yet the Thrapston reference is one of only two, the other at Peterborough in the 1830 Directory. {The Soke of Peterborough was included in the County of Northampton until the 1974 reorganisation of local government} The canal usage of the River Nene effectively stops in 1845 when the Blisworth to Peterborough railway line via Thrapston opens. Though silk 'thread lace' is referred to in the introduction to the Thrapston(e) entry, no reference is made to a location. A 'silk lace' factory was demolished in Cozy Nook, at approximately the site of the rear entrance to the current Fire Station, in the 1960's, at the time of the widening of the High Street.

*3 = Thrapston Wharf adjacent to the bridge, buildings demolished late 1998

*4 a worker in leather *5 = etc. *6 A pattern was a wooden sole mounted on a iron oval ring, used as an overshoe to raise the shoe out of the mud or slush.
